We aren't quite to the end of our sadness from these last two years – in fact I think sadness may never truly end. But there are waves of happiness to be found all around, and we hope that today's program is one such wave for you.

Our program today is loosely modeled on the annual 'Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols', performed and broadcast around the world every Christmas Eve from King's College, London. That program uses biblical passages, Christmas carols, and choral anthems to tell the Christmas Story. Our program uses poetry and choral music to tell stories – or perhaps we should say to tell snapshots of stories – from our lives in 'These Unprecedented Times.' We sing of love, of grief, of hope, of loss, of dreams – songs that 'speak to us of joy and sorrow', as Kahlil Gibran writes in The Prophet. We are so glad you've come today to listen to our poetry and our songs and to share in what we hope is a wave of happiness for us all.


